COMMUNITY IN MOURNING: A PROMISE IN ACTION



In 2025, Arizona's **Timber Mesa Fire & Medical District** experienced a devastating loss when three firefighters died in the line of duty within a two-week period. The tragedy deeply affected the department, the families of the fallen and the surrounding community. In partnership with department leadership, the 100 Club of Arizona responded immediately, providing more than **\$94,000** in assistance to support both the families and the surviving first responders.

This critical support included emergency financial assistance to help ease immediate burdens for grieving families, as well as mental health resources for firefighters coping with the loss of their colleagues. By acting quickly, the 100 Club helped provide stability during an unimaginable time and reinforced its commitment to standing beside Arizona's public safety community when support is needed most.

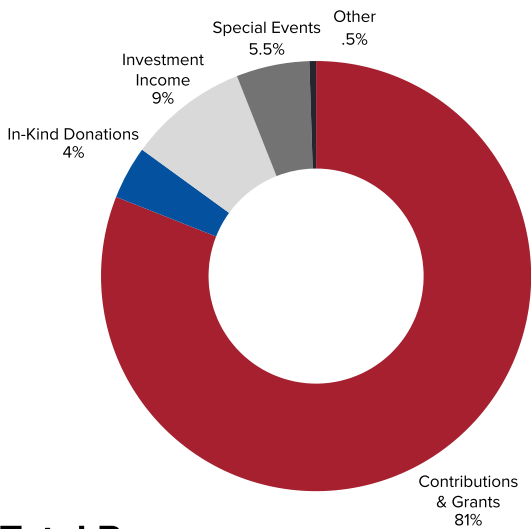
FINANCIALS

* FUNDING FOR SUPPORT

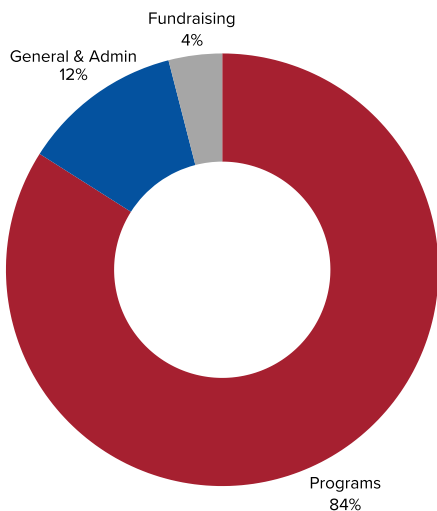
In 2025, philanthropic support generated more than **\$5.3 million** in revenue. The majority of this funding came from unrestricted gifts, allowing the 100 Club of Arizona to respond where need was greatest. **84% of every dollar** was invested directly into programs, reflecting an ongoing commitment to responsible stewardship and mission-driven impact.

Behind these numbers are powerful human stories. First responders receive support after life-altering line-of-duty injuries. Children of fallen heroes attend summer camps, receive tutoring, and earn scholarships which help them pursue higher education. Officers also access life-changing mental health resources after repeated exposure to traumatic calls.

Together, these stories reflect the bravery, resilience and dedication of public safety professionals who show up every day to protect and serve their communities.

STANDING WITH OUR HEROES

The 100 Club of Arizona responds within hours of critical incidents, ensuring families of fallen or injured public safety officers and firefighters are never alone. Leadership personally delivers financial assistance, connects loved ones with essential resources, and provides a lifetime promise of support to help ease unimaginable grief during their darkest moments.

This mission extends beyond line-of-duty deaths to include life-altering personal crises. In 2025, the **100 Club supported 154 individuals facing extraordinary challenges**, including cancer diagnoses, serious vehicle accidents and the loss of a spouse or child. Staff and board members prioritize being physically present—whether in hospital rooms or family homes—to offer stability, compassion and reassurance.

Ultimately, rapid response and long-term commitment define the organization. From the first moments of crisis through the years that follow, the 100 Club remains a steady source of support for Arizona's public safety professionals and the families who stand behind them.

MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAMS

* IMPACT

In 2025, we expanded access to critical mental health resources through an investment of more than \$1.7 million. Over 2,700 individuals received preventative training, and more than 1,200 officers and firefighters accessed direct support services, strengthening the well-being of those who serve.

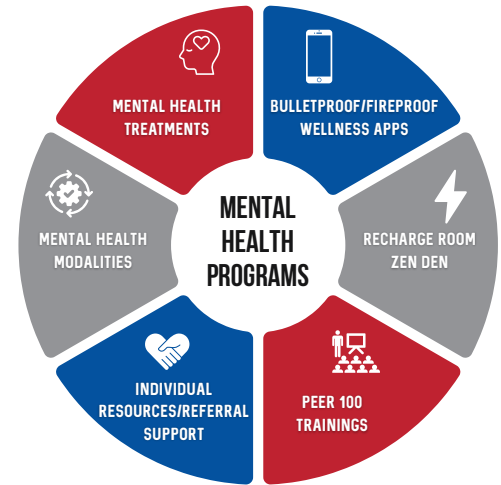

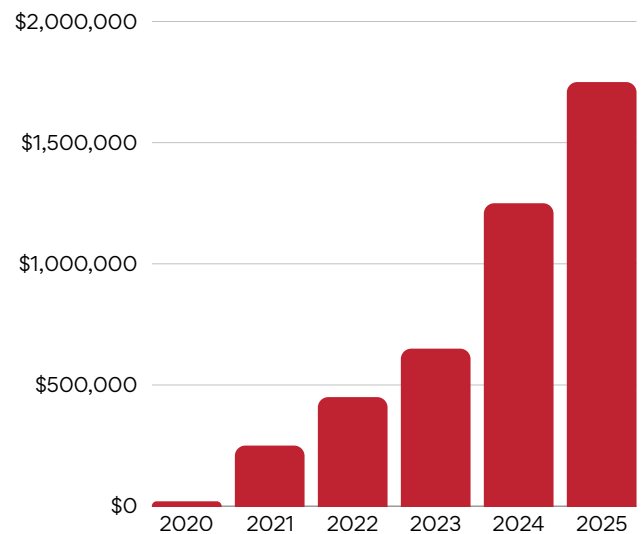

INJURY PREVENTION

Since 2004, the Injury Prevention Program has helped protect Arizona's public safety professionals by funding critical safety equipment and training. Through this program, agencies can access life-saving resources that are often beyond the reach of traditional budgets, helping ensure officers and firefighters are better prepared, better protected and able to return home safely.

* PROTECTING ARIZONA FIREFIGHTERS FROM THEIR GREATEST THREAT: CANCER

Cancer remains the leading cause of line-of-duty deaths among firefighters. In 2025, we provided direct support to more than 50 firefighters diagnosed with occupational cancer and mourned the loss of four heroes. Each diagnosis has a ripple effect, impacting families, departments and communities.

To address this growing threat, we launched a statewide Firefighter Cancer Awareness and Prevention Campaign focused on proactive, life-saving solutions. At its core is the goal of equipping every fire truck in Arizona with a StormStick decontamination system so firefighters can remove harmful carcinogens immediately after a fire.

Thanks to generous supporters, 150 units are already in service, with 350 more planned across the state to help protect the long-term health of those who protect all of us.



* ENHANCING K-9 SAFETY IN GLENDALE

The 100 Club of Arizona provided three night vision goggles to the Glendale Police Department K9 unit serving on the SWAT team. Nighttime operations are among the most dangerous, and this equipment helps officers and their K9 partners see more clearly, respond faster, and stay safer in critical moments. Protecting those who protect us when it matters most.

HONORING A LIFE OF SERVICE: THE KELLYWOOD FAMILY

Officer David Kellywood dedicated his life to protecting his community, a commitment which required the ultimate sacrifice when he was killed in the line of duty on February 17, 2020. He left behind his wife, Kamellia, and their two young sons, Gabriel and DJ, who were suddenly faced with immense grief alongside immediate emotional and financial strain. Within days of the tragedy, the 100 Club of Arizona stepped in to provide compassionate, immediate financial assistance. This vital lifeline allowed Kamellia to focus on her children and her healing rather than looming expenses during the family's darkest moments.

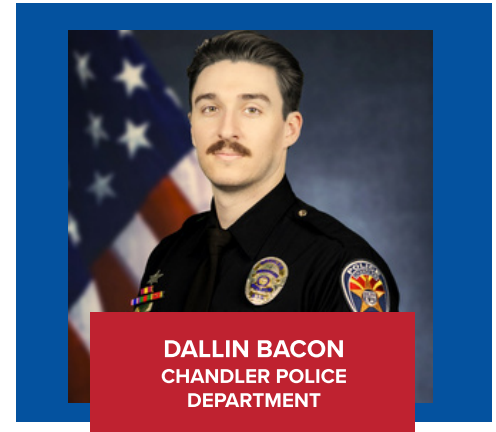
BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY

* 2026 POLICE OFFICERS OF THE YEAR

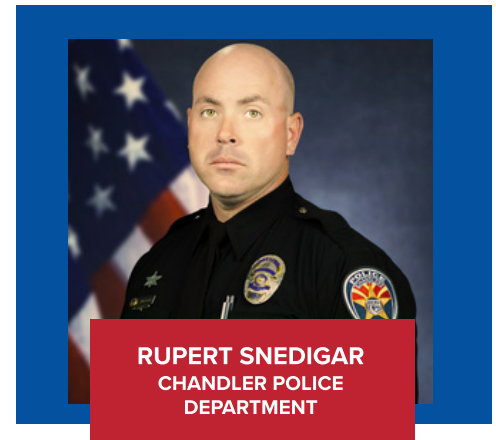
Chandler Police Department Officers Snedigar and Bacon represent what it truly means to serve and protect, demonstrating courage, quick thinking and a deep commitment to keeping others safe. On January 1, 2026, they responded to a call involving a father who was threatening to harm his 7-year-old daughter while driving her home. When officers located the vehicle, they could hear the man continuing to make threats, and it was clear the child was in immediate danger.

Without hesitation, Officers Snedigar and Bacon, along with other officers on scene, moved in to help. As Officer Snedigar opened the driver's door to rescue the child, the man raised a knife, forcing the officers to act in a split second to protect her. Their actions stopped a dangerous situation and saved the young girl from serious harm.

In a moment requiring courage and rapid decision-making, these officers put themselves in harm's way to protect a child. Their bravery and dedication make them deserving recipients of the 100 Club of Arizona's Police Officers of the Year.

* GOLF TOURNAMENT

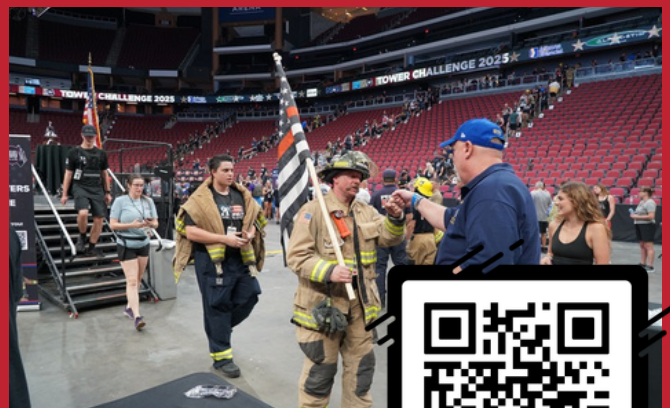

In 2025, 1,335 participants joined, raising more than \$66,000 to benefit Arizona's first responders.
